Course Entry Criteria	6 in GCSE German
Essential skills	An interest in the subject is the most important thing. A good grasp of grammar is also important, although this will be reinforced at the start of the course. You must have an interest in discussing and debating contemporary issues as you will be working on developing your speaking skills in class and with the foreign language assistant.
Year 12	OVERVIEW:
	Students will study a variety of topics throughout the two-year course, including aspects of the German speaking society such as Oktoberfest, Karneval or Weihnachten, the use of technology in modern dat Germany, changes to family life and immigration. Students will also be given the opportunity to complete an independent research project on an aspect of German society and will study both German film and literature. Students will take all modules at the end of Year 13. Work on Year 12 topics will be continued to a higher level in Year 13 when additional topics will be introduced.
